Why This Matters

HR 1 narrows Medicaid eligibility for certain noncitizens. Some noncitizen customers will lose coverage on October 1, 2026, and they must be informed in advance so they can prepare.

These changes are **required under federal law** and are **not changes initiated by the State of Illinois**.

Goal: Clear, timely communication that allows noncitizen Medicaid customers who will lose coverage on October 1 because of HR 1 have time to prepare.

What is Changing for Noncitizens?



Starting October 1, 2026, some lawfully present immigrants will lose Medicaid coverage. This includes but is not limited to¹:

- **Refugees and Asylees:** Individuals who left their home country for safety and don't yet have a Green Card
- **Humanitarian parolees:** Individuals allowed into the United States for urgent reasons for at least one year (including Ukrainian & Afghan parole programs)
- **Survivors of domestic violence or human trafficking**
- **Amerasian immigrants not adjusted to legal permanent resident (LPR) status**
- **Individuals granted withholding of removal**
- **Conditional entrants** allowed to stay in the United States for humanitarian or safety reasons under a temporary immigration status.

1. Includes individuals with certain qualified immigration statuses, such as refugees, asylees, trafficking survivors, Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) holders, certain parolees, VAWA applicants, and other protected humanitarian categories.

What is Changing for Noncitizens?

The following groups **will remain eligible**:

- **Naturalized Citizens**
- **Lawful permanent residents** (subject to the five-year waiting period unless federally exempt)
- **Certain Cuban and Haitian entrants**
- **Compact of Free Association (COFA) migrants** (from Marshall Islands, Micronesia or Palau)
- **Children under 19 years old**
- **Pregnant individuals**
- Individuals enrolled in a state-funded program including **AATV, VTTC, and HBIS²**

2. Medical Assistance for Asylum Applicants and Torture Victims, Victims of Trafficking, Torture, or Other Serious Crimes programs, and Health Benefits for Immigrant Seniors. The groups who are losing coverage due to the HR 1 noncitizen eligibility changes may still receive **Emergency Medicaid**, but not full-scope benefits—see slide 8.

How You Can Help Healthcare Providers



- **Inform affected patients** that some groups, including refugees, asylees, humanitarian parolees, and survivors of trafficking or domestic violence, may lose federally funded Medicaid as of **October 1, 2026**.
- **Remind pregnant patients** they may still qualify for other Medicaid programs. HFS will send personalized notices about any changes to impacted individuals. Members can call **1-877-805-5312** to apply or confirm coverage.
- **At health visits, encourage customers to update their contact information with us.** Educate customers about updating their address and immigration status so we can inform them about benefit changes.
 - For anyone receiving benefits, make sure we have their current immigration status, and provide any documentation of updates. **In some cases, a change in a customer's immigration status may mean they are eligible for additional coverage alternatives.**
 - Inform everyone to update their address, phone number, and email TODAY by visiting **abe.illinois.gov**, or calling **877-805-5312**.
- **Post and distribute materials** from this toolkit in waiting areas and exam rooms. Share the provided messaging and graphics on your social channels.
- **Help patients prepare before Oct. 1, 2026**, by encouraging them to schedule needed care and refill prescriptions before any coverage changes occur.

How You Can Help

Stakeholders & Advocates



- **Identify community members who may lose coverage**, including refugees, asylum seekers, parolees, and survivors of trafficking or domestic violence. If they will lose coverage under the HR 1 changes, share with them the information and resources on the next page about healthcare alternatives.
- **Remind pregnant patients** they may still qualify for other Medicaid programs. We will send personalized notices about any changes. Members can call **1-877-805-5312** to apply or confirm coverage.
- **Help customers update** their address and immigration status on file with HFS so we can keep customers informed about benefits changes that may impact them. You can review and update your information through:

- **Post flyers and distribute palm cards** at check-in or reception. Include palm cards in food bank bags or other distributions. Share the toolkit messaging and graphics on social media. Make a plan to integrate this toolkit into your regular communications with affected Medicaid customers.

Loss of Full-Scope Medicaid Coverage

Inform individuals whose Medicaid coverage ends that they may be able to get primary and preventative care in other places.

- Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC) and free and charitable clinics serve uninsured and underinsured people regardless of their immigration status and ability to pay.

- These groups may still receive **Emergency Medicaid** but not full-scope benefits.

Emergency Medicaid for Noncitizens

Who is Eligible?



Noncitizens who:

- do not qualify for federal Medicaid based on immigration status
- are aged 19 and older
- meet all other factors of federal Medicaid eligibility

Emergency Medicaid covers emergency medicaid services delivered in a hospital setting as a result of a medical condition that is severe enough to:

- Place health in serious jeopardy;
- Create serious impairments to bodily functions; or
- Create serious dysfunction in any organ or part.

Noncitizens (aged 19 and older) who lose full scope Medicaid due to the federal noncitizen criteria may be eligible for Emergency Medicaid if all other factors of eligibility are met

Read on to find out if you are affected and what options you may have.

If any of the following applies to you, you do NOT need to do anything. Your Medicaid eligibility is NOT affected. If you do not meet at least one of these qualifications, your Medicaid coverage is affected by the federal changes. However, you may qualify for AATV, a state-funded insurance program for select noncitizens.



Naturalized Citizens

Born in the U.S., or became a citizen



Lawful Permanent Resident (Green Card holder)

Subject to meet or are exempt from the 5-year eligibility bar - call 1-877-805-5312 to confirm.



Cuban or Haitian Entrant

Only if you entered under a specific humanitarian program - call 1-877-805-5312 if this applies to you.



COFA Migrant

From Marshall Islands, Micronesia, or Palau



Pregnant

Pregnant people are covered under other Medicaid regardless of immigrant status. Visit HFS Moms and Babies website or call 1-877-805-5312 to confirm eligibility and apply today.



Under 19 Years Old

Children are covered under "All Kids" regardless of immigrant status. Visit the HFS All Kids website or call 1-877-805-5312 to confirm eligibility and apply today.

Your Medicaid Coverage may end on October 1, 2026.

HR 1 NONCITIZEN TOOLKIT

GETTING COVERAGE THROUGH OTHER PROGRAMS

Illinois AATV is state-funded - HR 1 does not affect it.

What is AATV? AATV (Asylum Applicants & Torture Victims) is a medical program paid for by the state of Illinois - not the federal government. That means HR1 does not affect it. If you qualify, it may cover your medical care for up to 36 months. It includes the following noncitizen populations:

- Individuals receiving services through a federally funded torture treatment center
- Individuals who have filed for a T Visa, a U Visa, or Asylum
- Individuals who have an appeal pending regarding a T Visa, a U Visa, or Asylum application
- Individuals who have obtained their U Visa
- Individuals who have filed an application as a derivative family member or are included as a derivative family member in an application for a T Visa, a U Visa, or asylum of said applicants

If you meet ALL of the following criteria, you may be eligible for AATV.

If you do not meet all of these, call 1-877-805-5312 to find out what other options may be available.

Have a pending asylum application or appeal - or are a victim of torture

A torture victim is someone getting treatment at a federally-funded torture treatment center.

Are 19 and older

Have income at or below Federal Poverty Level (FPL)

About \$1,330/month for an individual (2026 level). Call 1-877-805-5312 to confirm.

5

Have total assets of \$17,500 or less

Money in checking/saving accounts are included, but your home and one car do not count towards this limit. About \$1,330/month for an individual (2026 level). Call 1-877-805-5312 to confirm.

Updating your info does not mean your benefits are changing.

Option 1

Starting October 1, 2026, eligibility rules for Illinois Medicaid are changing. Some noncitizens may lose coverage. Impacted members will receive a personalized notice by mail from DHS/HFS, so please update your contact info at [ABE.Illinois.gov](https://abe.illinois.gov).

Individuals who lose Medicaid coverage can still get primary and preventive care. Federally Qualified Health Centers and free/charitable clinics serve uninsured and underinsured individuals regardless of immigration status or ability to pay. Find locations at www.illinoisfreeclinics.org and www.iphca.org/health-center-locator.

Option 2

Important Medicaid Update for 2026: Beginning October 1, some noncitizen groups may no longer qualify for Medicaid.

Those who will REMAIN eligible include:

- Naturalized citizens
- Lawful permanent residents who meet or are exempt from the 5-year eligibility bar
- Certain Cuban and Haitian entrants
- COFA migrants
- Children under 19 & pregnant people
- Individuals enrolled in AATV, VTTC, or HBIS

Make sure your address is up to date at [ABE.Illinois.gov](https://abe.illinois.gov) so you don't miss your notice.

Option 3

Medicaid changes are coming October 1, 2026. If you are a refugee, asylee, humanitarian parolee, or a survivor of trafficking or domestic violence, and do not have your green card (LPR Card) this change *may* affect your coverage.

HFS will mail notices to everyone impacted, check your mail and keep your info current at [ABE.Illinois.gov](https://abe.illinois.gov). Individuals who lose Medicaid coverage can still get primary and preventive care. Federally Qualified Health Centers and free/charitable clinics serve uninsured and underinsured individuals regardless of immigration status or ability to pay. Individuals who lose coverage may also still receive Emergency Medicaid, but not regular, full-scope benefits.

- Individuals enrolled in a state-funded program, including AATV, VTTC, and HBIS

Here is what you need to do now to stay informed:

- **Watch your mail.** HFS will send a personalized notice if your coverage is affected. Do not disenroll on your own.
- **Prepare before October 1, 2026.** Schedule needed appointments and refill prescriptions while you still have coverage.
