Family Support Program (FSP)

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About the Family Support Program

- Formerly known as the Individual Care Grant (ICG)
- Administered by <u>89 III. Admin. Code 139</u>, commonly referred to as 'Rule 139'
 - Rule 139 became effective in May of 2018
- Youth enrolled in FSP receive 180 days of initial program eligibility, and can apply for a continued 180 days of program eligibility
- Administrative and Clinical Support is performed by a contracted Quality Improvement Organization/Peer Review Organization (QIO/PRO)



About the Family Support Program (cont.)

 Youth enrolled in FSP are assigned an FSP Coordinator

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- The FSP Coordinator may assist the family in completion and submission of any required documentation, and in the identification of services
- FSP provides youth access to differing levels of treatment services, including community-based and residential treatment services



FSP Eligibility

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Youth Eligibility Criteria

- 1. Under the age 18 at the time of application
- When seeking services, not be under the guardianship or in the legal custody of any unit of Federal, State or local government
- Diagnosed with a Severe Emotional Disturbance (SED)
- 4. Demonstrates sufficient cognitive capacity, and behavior or symptoms that are likely to respond to psychiatric treatment and interventions
- 5. Demonstrates a history of illness that indicates a chronic condition, not an acute episode



Parent/Guardian Requirements and Responsibilities

- 1. Demonstrate and maintain residence in Illinois as defined in Section 2-10 of the Illinois Public Aid Code
- 2. Actively participate in the FSP youth's treatment
- 3. Be primarily responsible for financial obligations associated with participation in the program, including coordinating funding from all available sources, such as health insurance coverage
- 4. Notify HFS of any changes in financial assets, healthcare coverage, home addresses, custody of the youth, and if necessary, make available sources of public financial support



Parent/Guardian Responsibilities (cont.)

- 5. Assist in completion of all applications for public assistance programs, such as:
 - Medical Assistance

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- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Social Security Benefits (SSA)
- Forms and documents required by HFS

Other programs as appropriate



Parent/Guardian Responsibilities (cont.)

- 6. If the youth is clinically appropriate for residential treatment services, the parent/guardian must:
 - Cooperate with the residential facility's requirements for the youth's care, treatment and discharge to the community

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FSP Application Process

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FSP Application

- The FSP Application is available on the <u>HFS Website</u>
 - The family may complete the FSP application with the assistance of their FSP coordinator
- Completed application materials may be submitted by the parent or guardian to the Department's designated QIO/PRO
- The Department's QIO/PRO reviews completed applications based on eligibility and clinical criteria to determine whether the youth is clinically appropriate for FSP

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FSP Services

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Care Coordination

- All youth enrolled in FSP are assigned to an FSP Coordinator.
- The FSP Coordinator assists the family with:
 - Service planning: identification of services and prior authorization when necessary
 - Case management: creation of an IM+CANS, the Department's Integrated Assessment and Treatment Planning tool, etc.
 - Service Coordination: Identifying service providers to improve clinical outcomes

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Family Support Services

- Family Support Services provides funds for services and supports not normally available, with the purpose of promoting stabilization of the youth in their community
- Examples:

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- Therapeutic Support Services: equine therapy, weighted blanket
- Individual Support Services: gym membership, summer camps

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Residential Treatment

- Residential Treatment services are subject to prior authorization and review of medical necessity
- Treatment services must be at an in-network Residential Treatment Facility
- Once the youth is determined clinically appropriate for residential treatment, the FSP Coordinator assists the family with:
 - Identifying potential facilities available for placement
 - Preparing and submitting referral packets to potential residential placements



Value of FSP

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Program Benefits

- Strengthens family stability
- Promotes community-based services
- Improves and promotes clinical outcomes
- Encourages meaningful impact through coordinated services
