Eligibility Criteria for the MFTD Waiver



- Customers who, because of the severity of their physical illness or disability would require admission to a hospital or nursing facility without the services provided under the waiver.
- Meet the minimum score on Level of Care (LOC) tool.
- U.S. citizen or legal alien.
- Resident of the State of Illinois.
- Be Medicaid eligible (with waiver of parental income).
- Resides with family or legally responsible adult(s) in a private residence.
- Estimated cost of care is less than estimated cost for institutional care.

• As of 2017, all waiver customers may stay enrolled in the waiver program, regardless of age, if enrolled prior to their 21st birthday.

• Currently there are approximately 1,300 customers receiving services through the MFTD waiver.



Waiver Services

- Respite
- Specialized Medical Equipment and Supplies
- Environmental Accessibility Adaptations
- Family Training
- In-Home Shift Nursing for adults over age 21
 - (Under 21 provided through EPSDT)
- Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) for adults over age 21
 - (Under 21 provided through EPSDT)
- Nurse Training
- Placement Maintenance Counseling Services



- EPSDT—Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment
 - The EPSDT benefit provides comprehensive and preventive health care services for children under age 21 who are enrolled in Medicaid.
 - Routine medical, vision, dental, hearing, lead screening, immunizations, health education, etc.
 - States are required to provide any additional health care services that are medically necessary to treat, correct, or reduce illnesses.
 - In Illinois, EPSDT covers in-home shift nursing and certified nursing assistant services for children under age 21 who are enrolled in Medicaid, regardless if they are enrolled in the MFTD waiver.



• Respite:

- Periodically relieving the family of care-giving responsibilities.
- Physician ordered service provided by licensed nurses and certified nurse aides in the customer's home or in a Community-Based Health Care Center.
- Limited to a maximum of 14 days or 336 hours annually.
 - During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency, the maximum number of hours of respite has been increased to 672 hours annually.



- Specialized Medical Equipment and Supplies:
 - Medical supplies, equipment, and appliances needed to maintain a customer safely in the home.
 - There is a \$25,000 maximum per customer per five-year period for any combination of Environmental Accessibility Adaptations and Specialized Medical Equipment and Supplies.



- Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA):
 - Physician ordered service provided to adults (age 21 and over)
 - Assist with checking vital signs, measuring height and weight, measuring intake and output, feeding, toileting, turning and positioning, transferring, bathing, observing response to care, reporting, and recording observations of the customer's condition, cleaning and caring for equipment, transporting, etc.
 - For customers under age 21, CNA services are provided through the EPSDT benefit.



Environmental Accessibility Adaptations:

- Physical adaptations to the home or family vehicle which are necessary to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of the customer, or which enable customer to function with greater independence in the home or community.
 - Minor carpentry; installation of ramps and grab-bars; house lifts (when a ramp is not possible); widening of doorways; bathroom modifications; installation of specialized electric and plumbing systems necessary to accommodate the medical equipment; professional electrical assessments to ensure that the medical equipment that requires electricity can safely operate in the home; and generator purchase and/or repair.



• Family Training:

- Instruction about treatment regimens and use of equipment necessary to safely maintain the customer at home.
- It may also include training such as Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR).



In-Home Shift Nursing:

- Physician ordered service provided by licensed RNs and LPNs to adults (age 21 and over) that require hourly shift nursing rather than an intermittent visit to perform a specific task.
 - For customers under age 21, in-home shift nursing is provided through the EPSDT benefit.
 - During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency, legally responsible adults who are licensed RNs and LPNs have been allowed to provide hourly shift nursing to their child.
 - HFS and DSCC are working with CMS to make this a permanent waiver service.

Nurse Training:

• Provides up to four (4) hours per nurse per year of child specific training in the use of new or unique prescribed equipment, or special care needs of the customer.



- Placement Maintenance Counseling Services:
 - Physician ordered short-term, issue-specific family or individual counseling for the purpose of maintaining the customer in the home.
 - Provided by a licensed behavioral health professional.


Are either U.S. citizens or eligible non-citizens within the specific categories






Emergency Home Response System



CCP Demographics







Authorized Caseload as of 8/18/2022 – 75,834







Community Care Program Rate Increases over the past 4 years


Adult Day Service Increases



Rate increases from 12/1/2019 to 1/1/2023 account for a 70% increase over 4 years for ADS and a 36% increase for ADST.

Rate increases from 12/1/2019 to 1/1/2023 account for a 40% increase over 4 years.



Efforts to Address Workforce Shortages

- Care Coordination Units (CCUS) Workforce Retention Grants aimed to assist with hiring new staff and retaining current staff were provided via FMAP reinvestment incentive. A total of \$18.4MM invested across state fiscal years 2022 and 2023.
- CCUs also received rate increases for 10 different billable care coordination activities which leads to a projected
 \$11.3MM investment in the first year.
- In-Home Service Providers (INH) \$14MM in-home rate increases for FY 2023, 40% increase to INH providers over the last 4 years.
- Adult Day Service Providers (ADS) Re-invention/preservation grant funds to sustain ADS sites. ADS providers have seen a 70% increase over 4 years for direct service rates and a 36% increase for ADS transportation rates.
- Waiver Appendix K flexibilities Spouses providing in-home services.
- Survey of the CCU and INH provider networks to further understand workforce shortages, barriers to hiring new staff and challenges associated with retaining staff. Survey responses due back end of August 2022.



Critical Event Reporting Application (CERA)


- CERA was implemented on August 8, 2018.
- Since then, 75,755 critical incident reports have been entered into CERA.
 - These reports cover 88,608 incidents involving 26,247 individuals

- ▶Top 4 Categories:
 - ▶ Unanticipated Hospitalization
 - ► Emergency Department Visit
 - ► Fall with Injury
 - ► Fall without Injury
- ► Most reports with Fall as the category also have either Hospitalization or ED visit also checked.




